



Hand Hygiene Compliance Rates

The single most common way of transferring healthcare-associated infections (HAIs) in healthcare settings is on the hands. Healthcare providers move from patient to patient and room to room while providing care and working in the patient environment. This movement provides many opportunities for the transmission of organisms on hands that can cause infections. Proper hand hygiene will protect patients and providers and will reduce the spread of infections and the associated treatment costs, reduce hospital lengths of stay and readmissions, reduce wait times, and prevent deaths.

The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care has issued a directive under the Public Hospitals Act requiring hospitals to report hand hygiene compliance rates on an annual basis. The report consists of compliance:

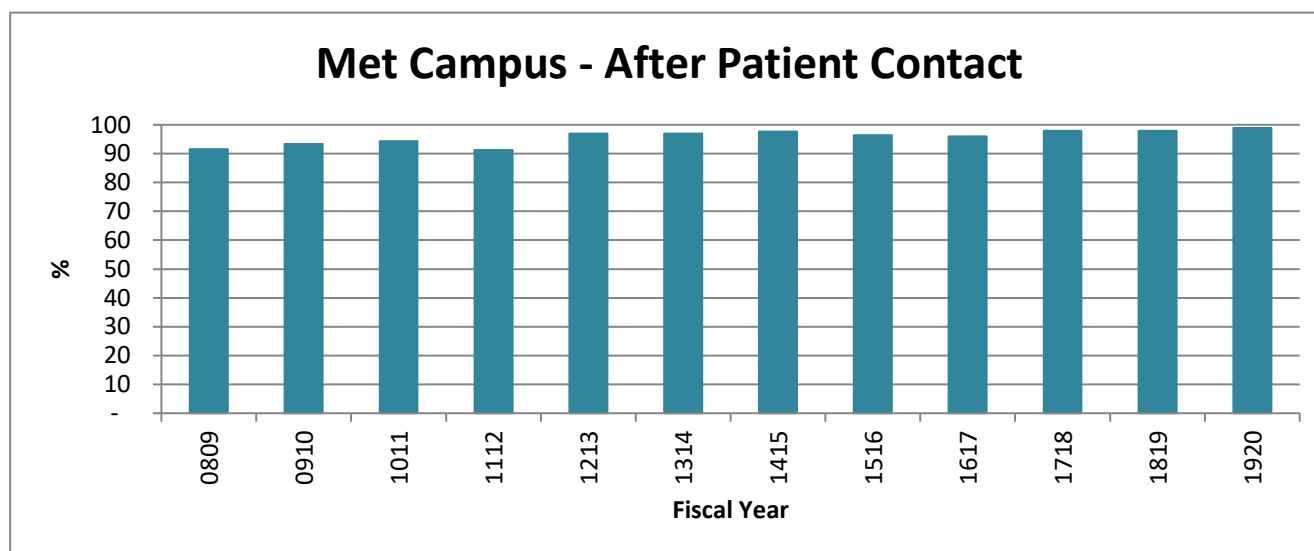
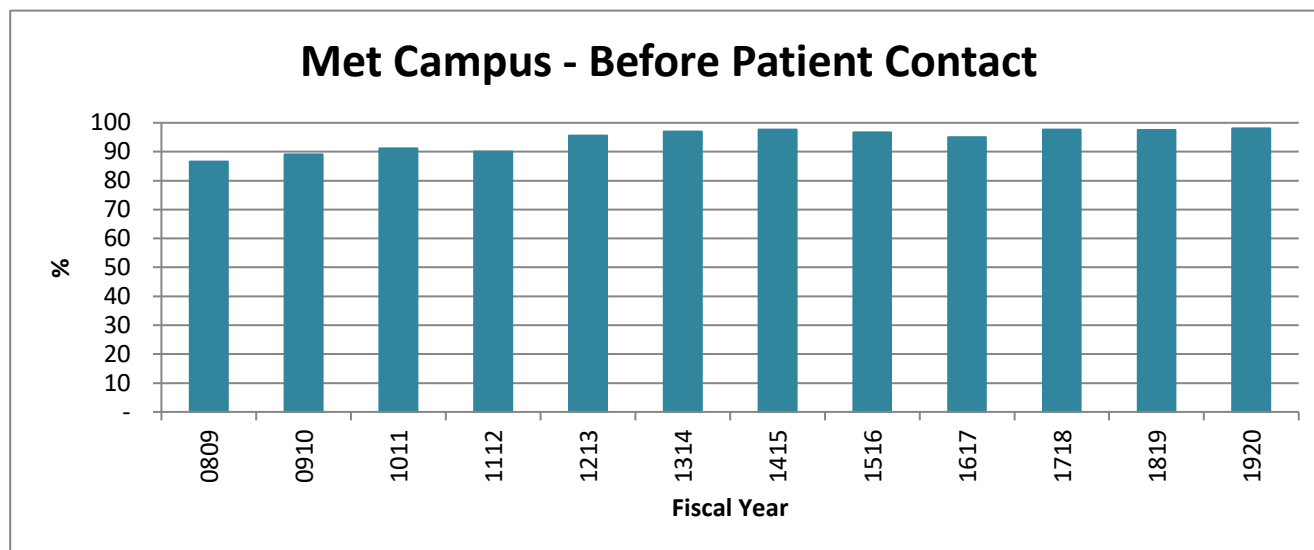
- Before initial patient/patient environment contact; and
- After patient/patient environment contact.
